



The importance of maintaining Rotary standards

In Chicago, a little over one hundred years ago, four friends used to meet regularly for lunch. They had little in common beyond liking one another's company. They were active in their own businesses and so they kept the duration of the meetings down to about an hour. Because they were careful how they spent their time they always started promptly.

One day a friend noticed the regular get-togethers, and from his manner the four took it that he would like to join them. They hummed and harred over this. Did they want to be more than four? Eventually they concluded they probably did, but cautiously. They agreed that there would be a candidate vetting process, and admission had to be by invitation. But before that, what characteristics should a proposer be sure of in his would-be candidate? This would have taken some defining. I do not know whether this has been covered in a history of the time, but we can be sure what the issues covered included being of impeccable character, being respected in their line of business, and being interesting company; and as each of the first four represented the tops of their businesses they probably looked for their like from different types of business, and for an assumption of commitment to regular attendance. At that time there would have been scores of groups meeting regularly. But this group that was to become the first Rotary Club was different. It was more than the ordinary businessmen's club, and it had a procedure for inviting new members which almost ensured continuity. Where other groups had their life and died, this one prospered. It grew, and it even took on a small community project. And as it grew the members devised how the weekly meetings should be run to ensure interest for all, and they appointed member functionaries to ensure the bonhomie of the occasion. Then one day one of their own members had to move to another town, or otherwise the Club was visited by someone from another town, and the person concerned was keen to founder a similar group in this other town. The idea of fostering similar clubs elsewhere took root. The first Club had to lay down rules of procedure and define the process through which the offshoot would eventually qualify for Rotary status. 'Extension' came into being. The Chicago Club had to register itself as a 'Rotary Club' and adopt a Constitution and Byelaws. Eventually the Rotary experíence spread to other countries, and R.I. came into being. All offshoot clubs in formation had to undertake strictures regarding their observation of standards.

We, today, have to be grateful for the care with which the key area rules were prepared. They ensure the creation of a successful Rotary Club wherever in the world a Rotary Club is being set up: allow any one of these standards to slip and you threaten the future of what might have been started up. Judge the success of your club by whether it can attract and keep the sort of new member you would like to be a member of your club: if this is not the case the club standards have slipped, and possibly your own have too. Working out where the fault lies is easy enough, but putting this right is enormously difficult.

Rotary at its best is a wonderful concept. And being a living organization it has undergone various changes over the years, and will continue to change in the future. We have to accept the need to live with change. I doubt that any change will prove bigger than the first one: the decision to expand the group of four.

Years ago I wrote to the then DG to inquire whether a gradual change that I perceived to be taking place was acceptable or should be resisted. "David" came his reply "You and I cannot be sure that, so long as standards continue to be observed, the changing Rotary world is not for the better." So long as standards continue to be observed, he said
