Period Poverty Stigma Ends With Us

Period poverty is a growing issue that affects young girls all over the world. It can be hard to imagine a situation where girls lack access to basic menstrual hygiene products such as sanitary pads, tampons or other menstrual health items.

This results in girls missing out on school, feeling embarrassed and ashamed of their bodies, and facing other social challenges due to their inability to manage their periods with dignity. Many girls miss up to 4 days of school each month due to a lack of sanitary towels.

The effects of period poverty go beyond just physical discomfort; it has psychological impacts on young girls too. It can lead to feelings of isolation, embarrassment, shame, and even depression. As a result, period poverty can have long-term effects on the mental health of young women and can even prevent them from reaching their full potential in life.



For this reason, the Rotary Club of Karen set out to distribute reusable sanitary towels to form 1 students at Karen C Secondary School in celebration of International Women's Day 2023 theme 'Embracing Equity'. The school has about 400 students in forms 1 to 4, with a majority of them coming from lower-income communities where period poverty is a reality.

80 form 1 students were provided with two pads each that they can wash and reuse, thus reducing the impacts of period poverty. The Interact Club of Woodland High School handstitched the pads and donated them to Karen C through the Karen Rotary Club.

2. International Women's Day - A Fireside Chat on Embracing Equity as Leaders

On March 8th we had the honour of hosting incredible women for the Mega Joint Fellowship in conjunction with 40 other Rotary Clubs. The talk aimed to bring the habits that allow diversity, equity and inclusion (DEI) to happen and for a community to thrive. Here are some key takeaways from the discussions:

Diversity is what we are and it refers to the range of differences among people. Equity is understanding that we are not the same, and ensures fair treatment. Inclusion creates an environment where all feel welcome and can contribute to their fullest potential. A place of psychological safety.

When we embrace Diversity, Equity and Inclusion, we create a community that values and respects differences, promotes equal opportunities, and fosters a sense of belonging for all individuals regardless of their backgrounds.



Emotional intelligence (EI) and diversity, equity, and inclusion (DEI) are related because EI skills such as self-awareness, empathy, and relationship management are critical in creating an inclusive environment. When individuals develop their EI skills, they are better equipped to understand and manage their own emotions and empathize with the experiences of others. This can lead to more effective communication, conflict resolution, and collaboration across diverse teams. DEI efforts also benefit from emotional intelligence as they seek to create an environment where everyone feels valued and respected. Inclusive leaders with high EI can create a safe and welcoming space for diverse perspectives to be heard, foster a culture of belonging, and help to drive positive change towards equity and justice.

Pause and ask yourself these questions:

- By first acknowledging or being aware of our differences what habits can we embrace as a community?
- Are we aware of our personalities and other personalities?
- Are we aware of the diversity of opinion? Do we allow others to share theirs?
- Have we created an avenue of feedback and accountability?
- Are we aware of how emotions primarily drive our behaviour and decisions?
- Have we created a space where everyone feels they can share?
- Do we act in a manner that promotes goodwill Have we been inclusive in our actions?
- Do we self-examine to see how we have created a space where not all feel welcome?
- Have we actively encouraged feedback, not from the strong types but from the silent ones?
- Do we hold people accountable, as a community, to erosive habits like shaming and social conflict that result in personal attacks? Or do we encourage intellectual conflict?
- Are we expansive in our Thinking?
